PELC Provides Unique and Innovative Leadership Education Geared Toward Today's Demands and Tomorrow's Needs



The Police Executive Leadership College (PELC) is an intensive, three-week leadership course designed specifically for law enforcement executives. The program is based on the premise that leadership skills can be learned, and that given the opportunity for feedback and practice, executives can substantially improve their abilities to lead. Topics focus on skills vital to both personal and organizational long-term change. Emphasis is given to the practical application of leadership concepts.

The three weeks of PELC are scheduled with approximately one month intervals between the second and third weeks. These intervals, along with the time prior to the first week, provide time for reading assignments, writing papers, and immediate application of the concepts taught. Throughout each class day, students are actively involved in the learning process through group discussion, team projects, problem-solving exercises, leadership assessments and oral presentations.

PELC is an in-residence program. Lodging, noon meals, breaks, and all learning materials are included in the program tuition. Students are responsible for all other costs.



Who Should Attend PELC?

Chiefs, Sheriffs, Private Sector Executives and Command-level Staff (Sgt. and above) who are willing to learn, change, and devote time away from the job to improve their leadership skills. PELC is geared to executives from all agency sizes.

Curriculum

The PELC curriculum is comprehensive and challenging. It was developed by a committee of police executives and academicians and is regularly reviewed to ensure appropriateness and quality. Change, both personal and organizational, is a theme woven throughout the curriculum. Topics covered include:

Location

PELC is held at a hotel in the Columbus, Ohio area.

Dates

Tuition

Tuition pays only a portion of the total cost to attend PELC. The remaining costs are subsidized by donations made to the Law Enforcement Foundation by corporations and foundations. The fee, which is listed on the application form, covers all instruction, course materials, lodging, lunches and breaks.

Admission
